

What is Open University?
OU is the lifelong learning
program of The Shepherd's
Center of Richmond. Instructors
are volunteers recruited from
Richmond's university and
professional communities.

What is The Shepherd's Center of Richmond?

The Shepherd's Center of Richmond (TSCOR) is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to encourage older adults to remain active and independent.

What does OU cost? There are three sessions in one academic year. The cost is \$45 per session (not per class) for TSCOR members and \$75 per session for non-members.

Do I have to become a member of TSCOR to attend OU?
No, membership is not required.

What does membership cost? Membership is \$25 and runs from July through the following June. One great membership benefit: FREE ATTENDANCE to ALL Monday and Thursday lunch speakers for one year. That's \$25 for 48 speakers! (Does not include admission to courses.)

Can I attend just one course? You may attend just one class or as many classes as you like for the full tuition cost. We do not charge per individual course, but for the entire 8-week session.

Does OU meet in person? OU meets in person on Mondays at St. Luke Lutheran Church, and on Wednesdays at St. Mary's Catholic Church for *Lunch & Life*. We do not meet in person on Thursdays this session.

Does OU offer online classes? Yes, via Zoom some Monday classes and all Tuesday and Thursday classes are online. All Monday and Thursday lunch speakers are online. Please see individual class listing for details.
