The course traces the evolution of bop as a continuation of the jazz tradition and how the interaction of socioeconomic factors during WWII induced a handful of young black musicians to create a new jazz idiom.

D-Day and the Normandy Campaign

8-week course: In person and via Zoom.
We'll begin with a brief review of the situation in 1943, Allied and German command structure, and training for the operations; discuss the landings on all the beaches and troop movements from June 7 on; highlight combat for Caen, Carentan, Cherbourg, St. Lo, Operation Cobra, Falaise Pocket and others; and end with a review of the last, but controversial landing in the south of France at the end of August 1944.

- Q. What is Open University?
- A. The lifelong learning program of The Shepherd's Center of Richmond.
- Q. What is The Shepherd's Center of Richmond?
- **A.** A volunteer-driven, nonprofit organization, whose mission is to encourage older adults to remain active and engaged.
- Q. When is Open University?
- A. It is held in the fall, winter and spring during three 8-week sessions. A variety of classes and lunch speakers is offered Monday through Thursday. See schedule for details.
- Q. Where is Open University?
- A. The Shepherd's Center partners with churches for onsite locations. We also have online options! See schedule for details.
- Q. Can I attend just one class?
- A. Tuition is a flat fee. It gives you access to everything in the



- Q. What does Open University cost?
- A. For members of The Shepherd's Center, tuition costs \$50 per session. For non-members, it costs \$80 per session.
