New Building, New Growth

What an incredible year it has been! Last year I promised growth, and grow we did!



Thanks to some significant milestones, we've laid a strong foundation for the future of The Shepherd's Center of Richmond. Central to this success has been our move to a new, more accessible office on Monument Avenue. This move not only expanded our space, but also opened new possibilities for growth, making "New Building - New Growth" the perfect theme for this year's annual campaign.

The new office has truly been a catalyst. It has allowed us to expand the Open University schedule to include classes on Tuesdays and Fridays, and our multipurpose room has become a hub for learning, socializing, and even Board meetings. We've hosted movie screenings, classes, and more in this versatile space.

Our programs and services continue to flourish, evidenced by the following:

- Open University participation grew 19%
- membership increased 12%
- and volunteers rose from 11%

Our community has shown its support, withdonations increasing from \$58,797 to \$86,171 over the past year.

We still face challenges, however.
While our transportation program's client base has more than doubled - from 53 to 116 - the growth in volunteer drivers has not kept pace.
We now have 51 drivers, up from 35, but this hasn't been enough to meet the increasing demand for rides.

We provided only 598 rides this year, down from 718 the previous year. As the aging population grows, the need for transportation becomes even more critical.

While we've seen incredible support from our participants, we keep our membership dues and Open University tuition low to encourage broad involvement. Recently, a significant bequest helped us remain financially stable, but bequests are unpredictable. Our new office, while offering tremendous flexibility, comes with higher costs.

Last year, we set an ambitious goal of \$40,000 for our Annual Campaign and surpassed it, raising over \$44,000. This year, we aim even higher with a goal of \$50,000. It's a stretch, but one we believe is necessary to continue offering the programs and services you've come to rely on.

With your continued support, I am confident we can achieve it.
The Shepherd's Center of Richmond has an inspiring story to tell, and I hope you will help us write the next chapter with your contribution.

A. Now, in retirement, I enjoy kayaking, canoeing, hiking, photography, and woodworking... and don't forget volunteering!


Q. How are you involved with the Shepherd's Center?

The Open University is seeing - literally - a unique course this session: an in-person art appreciation class.

This fall, Dr. Jim Brown is teaching "Beginner's Mind: Seeing Beyond Your First Impressions of Art." After an initial orientation class in the multi-purpose room at the Center, this course is going out into the real world to view artworks in person.

As one student says, "Dr. Brown encourages his students to really study a work of art, whether it be a painting, sculpture, or a work of mixed media. Given that every detail of a work is intentional, that observation is key to what the artist was trying to convey. Of course, abstract ideas are more difficult to penetrate, but that detailed study always brings the viewer to a better appreciation for the work and Dr. Brown's class has led me to that greater appreciation."
